THEME OVERVIEW

Growing with our Community

● PLACE ● POSITION ● PARTNERSHIP

Last year's NGA, examined the trend in Australia's population which is expected to grow from the current 22 million to 35.9 million by 2050. Population growth will create opportunities and challenges for governments and communities. Meeting the demands of a bigger Australia will require substantial new physical infrastructure as well as the need for the economy to remain internationally competitive, innovative, more inclusive and sustainable. What we as a nation choose to invest in, how we invest and where we invest will have profound impacts on local communities across Australia and influence where and how Australians will live.

At the national level, reform (and, in particular, micro-economic reform) has been at the forefront of Australia's public policy debate and practice over the past twenty years. Reform has helped transform the Australian economy, and made a significant contribution to preparing the nation to meet the challenges of economic shocks such as the Global Financial Crisis. Further reform is essential if Australia is to remain internationally competitive as well as meet the future challenges of job creation, skills shortages, providing adequate and appropriate social support and achieving ecological sustainability.

Managing the local and regional impacts of reform is a significant challenge for governments. All reform has the potential to impact local and regional communities including the concentration of benefits and burdens in localities such as cities, regions or specific neighbourhoods.

Local governments are at the 'coal-face' of managing change, planning, coordination and provision of infrastructure and services for their local communities. It is therefore essential that local governments are consulted, and their policies and plans are taken into account when national reforms are being designed and implemented.

The theme of the 2011 NGA is *Growing with our Community: Place, Position and Partnership*. The aim is to stimulate ideas about new ways of doing business to meet the infrastructure and service needs of people in their local communities.

The 'Place' topic recognises that individuals and households live and work in: suburbs, neighbourhoods, farms, cities, towns, and local communities, i.e. 'places'. As these places differ geographically, culturally, economically and socially, it is not surprising that services need to be tailored to local circumstances. Under this topic, delegates will be invited to discuss models for improved collaboration between governments and governance models to jointly develop policy, plan, coordinate and deliver better infrastructure and services that will meet the circumstances of a particular 'place'.

The 'Position' topic refers to the need for local government to be seen and treated as an integral part of the Australian federal system. There are more than 560 local governments in Australia, all of them democratically elected, accountable to their communities and charged with the responsibility, under state legislation, to govern in the interests of their local communities. Under this topic delegates will be invited to explore ways of ensuring that local government is properly recognised in all government structures including the Australian Constitution, as well as how local government can be better involved in shaping Commonwealth and state service delivery to better meet local needs.

The third topic is 'Partnership'. This recognises that government service provision, including regulation, is a shared responsibility. While local government provides a wide range of services and infrastructure, many of these are in partnership with other levels of government. At the national level, the partnership between local government and the Australian Government has delivered benefits to every Australian community including through programs such as the Roads to Recovery Program (R2R) and the Regional and Local Community Infrastructure Program (RLCIP). Under this theme delegates will be encouraged to identify opportunities and challenges to the development of effective partnerships to improve the delivery of services and infrastructure at the local and regional level.

Regional Development → Sustaining Growth

Following the outcome of last year's federal election, Australia's regions and regional development policy have gained greater prominence. This year's Forum is an opportunity to hear the latest insights from the Commonwealth Minister and key federal politicians on regional development policy. In addition to the opportunity to network with other councils and key regional stakeholders, the 2011 State of the Regions Report will be launched at the Forum.

Many of the solutions to regional development challenges in Australia will need to be regionally specific and locally appropriate. As such it will be critical to develop strategies that can make the most of regional potential and develop better models for whole-of-government approaches for best practice governance and collaboration in regional areas.

The Regional Cooperation and Development Forum will workshop development opportunities and challenges in Australia through the lens of regional typologies identified in the *State of the Regions* Report—core metro, dispersed metro, producer, resource, rural and lifestyle. Specific questions to be addressed include:

- What framework around regional planning incorporating all stakeholders needs to be developed?
- How can local government and Regional Development Australia Committees engage effectively to advance regional interests?
- How will the infrastructure funds be administered and prioritised?

BEYOND THE MINING BOOM

The State of the Regions Report (SOR) is the most important annual analysis of Australia's regional economic development.

SOR divides Australia into 65 regions and allocates these regions into region types or zones, analyses how regions are performing and then analyses the likely consequences of current circumstances on the different types of SOR zones. The zones or region types are Knowledge-intensive regions, Dispersed Metro, Independent City, Lifestyle regions, Resource Based and Rural Regions.

The SOR is published annually by the Australian Local Government Association in partnership with National Economics.

Speaker Profiles



The Hon Julia Gillard MP

PRIME MINISTER

Julia Gillard was sworn in as the 27th Prime Minister of Australia on 24 June 2010 and re-sworn in as Prime Minister on 14 September 2010 following the 2010 Federal Election.

From 1996 to 1998 Ms Gillard served as Chief-of-Staff to the then Opposition Leader of the State of Victoria, John Brumby.

Julia Gillard first contested the Federal seat of Lalor for the Australian Labor Party in 1998 and was elected that year.

From 1998 to 2001 Ms Gillard served on the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Employment, Education and Workplace Relations. In 2001 Ms Gillard was appointed Shadow Minister for Population and Immigration and subsequently took on responsibilities for Reconciliation and Indigenous Affairs in 2003.

From 2003 to 2006 Ms Gillard served as Shadow Minister for Health. On 4 December 2006 Ms Gillard was appointed Deputy Leader of the Australian Labor Party and served as Shadow Minister for Employment and Industrial Relations and Social Inclusion.

Following the Australian Labor Party's victory at the 2007 Federal Election, Ms Gillard was sworn in as Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Education, Employment and Workplace Relations and Social Inclusion.

The Hon Tony Abbott MP

LEADER OF THE OPPOSITION

Tony Abbott was elected Member for Warringah at a by-election in March 1994.

On the election of the Howard Government in 1996 he was appointed Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Employment, Education, Training and Youth Affairs. In this role, he was responsible for the establishment of the successful Greencorps program for young people.

Following the 1998 election he was appointed to the new portfolio of Minister for Employment Services. As Minister, he oversaw the development of the Job Network and a major expansion of Work for the Dole.

In January 2001, Tony was promoted to Cabinet as Minister for Employment, Workplace Relations and Small Business. Following the 2001 election he was appointed Minister for Employment and Workplace Relations, Leader of the House and Minister Assisting the Prime Minister for the Public Service.

Tony was appointed Minister for Health and Ageing on 7 October 2003.

After the election in 2007 Tony became Shadow Minister for Families, Community Services, Indigenous Affairs and the Voluntary Sector, followed by Shadow Minister for Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs.

Tony became Leader of the Opposition on 1 December 2009.

The Hon Simon Crean MP

MINISTER FOR REGIONAL AUSTRALIA, REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT;
MINISTER FOR THE ARTS

Simon Crean is the Minister for Regional Australia, Regional Development and Local Government and the Minister for the Arts.

He is a politician of vast experience with more than 20 years in Federal Parliament and he served more than 20 years with the union movement.

He is the only member of the Government who has served in four Cabinets—in the Governments of Bob Hawke, Paul Keating, Kevin Rudd and Julia Gillard

Mr Crean's approach to regional development is marked by a lifelong commitment to driving national productivity and empowering local communities. He also has an enduring interest in the arts.

Prior to his appointment to his current portfolio in September 2010, Mr Crean was the Minister for Education, Employment and Workplace Relations as well as Minister for Social Inclusion in the lead-up and during the 2010 federal election campaign.

Mr Crean was the Trade Minister from December 2007 to July 2010 and he was also Leader of the Opposition from November 2001 to December 2003.

The Hon Greg Combet AM MP

MINISTER FOR CLIMATE CHANGE AND ENERGY EFFICIENCY

Greg Combet studied mining engineering at the University of New South Wales, working in the coal industry and later in community organisations. After working in the field of occupational health and safety, he went on to become a union official, at the same time graduating with a Bachelor's degree in Economics from the University of Sydney. He also has a Graduate Diploma in Labour Relations and the Law.



After working for the Waterside Workers Federation for some years, Greg joined the Australian Council of Trade Unions (ACTU) in 1993 and was leader of the ACTU from 1999 to 2007.

He was awarded a Member of the Order of Australia in 2006.

Following the Labor Party's Federal Election win in November 2007, Greg was appointed Parliamentary Secretary for Defence Procurement in the Rudd Labor Government.

In February 2009 he was appointed the Parliamentary Secretary for Climate Change and in June 2009 was appointed Minister for Defence Personnel, Materiel and Science and the Minister Assisting the Minister for Climate Change.

On 26th February 2010 he was awarded additional responsibility within the Climate Change and Energy Efficiency portfolio, giving him the direct responsibility for winding up the insulation program and putting the new Renewable Energy Bonus Scheme in place.

After the 2010 Federal Election, the Gillard Labor Government was formed on 7th September. Greg was promoted to Cabinet in the role of Minister for Climate Change and Energy Efficiency.

Senator Stephen Conroy

MINISTER FOR BROADBAND, COMMUNICATIONS AND THE DIGITAL ECONOMY

Senator the Hon Stephen Conroy was appointed Minister for Broadband, Communications and the Digital Economy in December 2007. He is also Deputy Leader of the Government in the Senate.

Stephen has a broad range of portfolio responsibilities, not least the National Broadband Network—the largest nation-building infrastructure project in Australian history, and the enabling foundation for our digital economy. Other responsibilities include Australia's digital television switchover, our national broadcasters the ABC and SBS, media policy, community broadcasting, cyber security and cyber-safety, radio frequency spectrum and Australia Post, among other things.

Passionate about media and communications and about engaging with industry to foster innovation and growth, Stephen has had active involvement in the communications portfolio since November 2001—first as Senate representative for shadow communications spokesman Lindsay Tanner and then as shadow communications minister until the November 2007 federal election.

Stephen was appointed as a Senator for Victoria for the Australian Labor Party in 1996. Previously he was an industrial officer and superannuation officer for the Transport Workers Union Victorian Branch from 1992 to 1996, a ministerial adviser to Victoria's Minister for Industry from 1990 to 1992 and an assistant adviser to the Speaker of the House of Representatives from 1988 to 1990.

Senator Bob Brown

LEADER OF THE AUSTRALIAN GREENS, SENATOR FOR TASMANIA

Senator Brown was born and educated in rural NSW and worked as a doctor before becoming the face of the campaign to save the Franklin River in 1982. He was elected to the Tasmanian state parliament in 1982 and over his ten year tenure notably achieved gun law reform, gay law reform and the expansion of the Tasmanian World Heritage area. In 1996, Bob was elected to the Senate, where he has led the national debate over the past 14 years on climate change, water, preventative healthcare, conservation, and human rights. His current term expires in 2014. He is a published author and acclaimed photographer.

Senator Barnaby Joyce

LEADER OF THE NATIONALS IN THE SENATE, LNP SENATOR FOR QUEENSLAND, SHADOW MINISTER FOR REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT, LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND WATER

Barnaby Joyce is a champion for rural communities and small business and believes that representing the people is a privilege. As a rural banker and accountant he understands the challenges of small business.

Barnaby has strong belief in a duty to your nation and community. He was a member of the Army Reserve and a long term member of St Vincent De Paul. He was awarded a Paul Harris Fellow by Rotary.

In 1998, Barnaby became the Leader of the Nationals in the Senate. In late 2009 he became the Shadow Minister for Finance and Debt Reduction and in early 2010 became the Shadow Minister for Regional Development, Infrastructure and Water.

Keynote Speaker Profiles



Len Brown

MAYOR OF AUCKLAND

Len Brown grew up in Otara and Papatoetoe, and went to Mayfield Primary School in Otara, Papatoetoe Intermediate and De La Salle College in Mangere.

He studied arts and law at Auckland University before joining the Auckland law firm Wynyard Wood, where he became a partner. He also co-founded the Howick Free Legal Service and the Greater East Tamaki Business Association.

Mr Brown entered politics when he was first elected to the Manukau City Council in 1992, serving as a councillor until 2004. He also served as chairperson of the Counties Manukau Health Council.

He ran for the Manukau City mayoralty in 2004, losing narrowly to long- serving mayor Sir Barry Curtis. He ran for the Manukau mayoralty again in 2007, winning by more than 14,000 votes.

Len Brown was elected mayor of a newly amalgamated Auckland and the first Auckland Council in October 2010.

He stood on a platform of delivering economic development, transport, supporting local communities and bringing Auckland together with inclusive leadership.

Robert Gottliebsen

BUSINESS COMMENTATOR

Robert Gottliebsen is one of Australia's leading business commentators and has a 40-year history in business journalism in Australia.

Founder and launch editor of *The Australian Financial Review's* Chanticleer column, founder and launch editor of *BRW* magazine, former host of the Business Daily on Sky News, former business columnist in the Fairfax newspapers and, until he joined Business Spectator, Robert was national business commentator for *The Australian*.

With strong financial backing, late in 2007 Alan Kohler, Stephen Bartholomeusz and Gottliebsen set out to establish one of the best free business and investment web sites in world —businessspectator.com.au. Gottliebsen says that BusinessSpectator has enabled him to explain the dramatic local and global events as they are happening.

The site covers around 700 business stories each day, has daily emails and stock monitoring plus an aggregation of the world's best commentary along with the commentary of the KGB (Kohler, Gottliebsen and Bartholomeusz) The response from the Australian community has been amazing and exceeded all expectations. Around 300,000 people come to the site each month and access more than six million pages. The associated enterprise, the Eureka Report, has doubled its subscriber base in 18 months.

In 1974 Gottliebsen started the Chanticleer column in *The Australian Financial Review* and in 1980 founded the Business Review Weekly publications, as part of Fairfax. He has been a regular radio and TV commentator.

In 2000 he became National Business Commentator of *The Australian* newspaper.











Grant O'Brien

CEO. WOOLWORTHS

Grant was appointed Deputy Chief Executive Officer and CEO designate on 4th April 2011.

In 1997 Grant relocated to Sydney to take up a position in Woolworths Supermarkets as Senior Business Manager Marketing as part of Project Refresh. He established a new national marketing service for the Woolworths Group.

In 2003 Grant joined the Freestanding Liquor Division as National Operations Manager and in 2006 was appointed General Manager Freestanding Liquor Division. Grant oversaw the growth of the Group±Dan Murphy's, BWS and Woolworths Liquor. He also led the integration of the ALH group and created a shared services platform for all Woolworths Liquor brands. He drove a very clear and decisive responsible retailing agenda that established Woolworths as a leader in responsible service of alcohol.

In January 2008 he was appointed Director New Business and Business Development, building new foundations for future growth out of the growth initiatives developed by the team was the Home Improvement market entry strategy.

In April 2010 Grant was appointed Chief Operating Officer for Australia Food and Petrol, with responsibility for Supermarket Operations, Online, Petrol and Thomas Dux.

Harinder Sidhu


DEPARTMENT OF CLIMATE CHANGE AND ENERGY EFFICIENCY

Harinder Sidhu is the First Assistant Secretary, Adaptation, Science and Communications Division of the Department of Climate Change and Energy Efficiency. She is responsible for developing and implementing a strategic approach to climate change adaptation issues and coordinating climate change science activities. In this role, she is also responsible for delivery of Department-wide communications and public affairs activities.

Previous to this position she was the Chief Adviser in the International Division where she was responsible for the development and management of Australia's international climate change policy, analysis, negotiation strategy and bilateral relationship development.

Prior to joining the Department of Climate Change and Energy Efficiency, Harinder held the position of Assistant Director-General in the Office of National Assessments and senior economic and defence adviser positions in the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet.

Harinder began her career as a diplomat with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, where she was posted to Cairo, Damascus and Moscow. She holds degrees in Economics and Law from the University of Sydney.



PANEL SESSION

Constitutional Recognition of Local Government

Constitutional reform is vital to protect the services that local government provides to the community.

Ongoing concern about the Australian Government's ability to directly fund community initiatives through local government has been highlighted by the High Court's decision in the Pape case in 2009. Ensuring that local government is included in the constitution will enable the Australian Government to directly fund local government.

The Government's announcement to hold a referendum prior to the next election in 2013 is a great step forward.

We have made major steps in achieving the support of the major political parties, but now there is an important role for each council to play in working to increase support for local government in our communities.

Recently, your council has been asked to pass a resolution in council chambers endorsing the position that a referendum be held by 2013 to change the Constitution to allow direct funding of local government bodies by the Commonwealth Government and also to include local government in any new Preamble to the Constitution if one is proposed.



THE PITCH: HOW DO WE SELL LOCAL GOVERNMENT?

A key element of the campaign for constitutional reform is to garner public support. ALGA has devoted considerable resources over the past three years to developing the case for constitutional reform. This has included undertaking extensive market research to ensure we understand public attitudes and what motivates them ahead of commencing any public relations activities.

Introducing the new Department of Regional Australia, Regional Development and Local Government

The Department of Regional Australia, Regional Development and Local Government was created in September 2010 with a mandate to implement the Australian Government's renewed focus on regional Australia and local communities.

The Department has a specific mission to engage with and empower local communities; to coordinate the development of regional and local government programs, and provide a dedicated source of advice on regional development.

The Department is responsible for ensuring the effective implementation of the September 2010 Agreement with the Independents – The Commitment to Regional Australia. The Commitment recognised that Australia is a nation of vast distance and great diversity. It seeks to entrench regionalism in Government policy development and to ensure that every community has a chance to be its best. Local government is a key partner in the regional agenda.

The Department supports local government through a range of functions:

- Regional Engagement: partners with 55 Regional
 Development Australia committees and engagement
 with Local Government. It administers the National
 Awards for Local Government, engages with the
 Australian Local Government Association and other local
 government organisations.
- Policy and Implementation: advances the policy agenda, including Local Government Reform, the Australian Centre of Excellence for Local Government, development of My Regions website and reviews into the total current funding provided through the Financial Assistance Grants program.
- Program Delivery including the Territories: administers a host of local government programs, including the Local Government Reform Fund, Financial Assistance Grants (FAGs), the Regional Local Community Infrastructure Program, and the Regional Development Australia Fund (RDAF).
- National Disaster Recovery Taskforce: provides strategic direction and oversight of the Commonwealth recovery effort.

Regional Development Australia Fund (RDAF)



The Regional Development Australia Fund (RDAF) will provide up to \$1 billion in funding over the next five years for regional projects facilitated by local councils and not-for-profit organisations, subject to the passage of the Mining Resource Rent Tax. Round One of the RDAF, which closed on 13 May 2011, will inject up to \$100 million into regional communities.



The Department of Regional Australia is now assessing those applications to confirm they meet the eligibility criteria. An independent Advisory Panel will review all eligible applicants and provide advice to the Minister on the most meritorious projects.

Local Councils are working in Sustainable Employment and Economic Development in Western Melbourne

Local councils are working with RDA Western Melbourne, in partnership with LeadWest, to provide funding for a Sustainable Employment and Economic Development (SEED) program that builds the leadership potential of disadvantaged young people and builds links to future employment placements.

The SEED project, based on a successful initiative by the Moonee Valley City Council, targets unemployed young people, aged 16–25, from various cultural backgrounds. It provides them with on-the-job skills development and the real life outcomes that come with having a job, being able to support themselves and contributing to the community.

Project staff support participants by providing a range of work and life skills to prepare them for entry into the workforce. Staff also work closely with employers to provide a range of flexible work placement options. Once a placement commences, support is provided to the young person and to the workplace mentor to ensure the success of the placement.

The project addresses the disadvantage and disconnection experienced by many young people as they transition into the workforce or further training. This is often a particular challenge for people living in public housing or from a culturally and linguistically diverse or refugee background.

A Project Control Group will soon identify potential new funding sources and invite expressions of interest from suitable consultants. This project was a Youth Engagement Category winner in the National Awards for Local Government.

LOCAL ADAPTATION PATHWAYS PROGRAM

From Risk to Action

→ ROYAL THEATRE

The Department of Climate Change and Energy Efficiency (the Department) identified a need for local governments to increase their awareness of, and adaptive capacity to respond to, the impacts of climate change. The Department provided funding to over 90 local governments through the Local Adaptation Pathways Program (LAPP).

A review of the LAPP recommended that the opportunity should be provided for local government participants to share the learnings through a forum with other participants, such as Federal Departments, the Australian Local Government Association and the states and territories. While much adaptation action requires consideration of local context, there was substantial commonality in the challenges and interests identified by councils through LAPP, and in particular, how to protect infrastructure and other assets.

The panel will discuss outcomes from the LAPP forum, the barriers and constraints identified, and most importantly, how learnings from the LAPP can be transformed into action.



STRENGTHENING LOCAL COMMUNITIES

Regional communities across Australia are now looking at how they can maximise their strengths and broaden their economy base to become stronger, more viable, more liveable and more sustainable in the years ahead.



MobileMuster E-Waste Collection Grants Apply Now for 2011-2012

The mobile phone industry's official recycling program MobileMuster supports the establishment of a free integrated e-waste collection scheme available to all residents.

The scheme should be industry funded, easily accessible and accepts all types of e-waste.

To help develop these local e-waste collection services MobileMuster will continue to offer local councils E-Waste Collection Grants of up to \$5,000 per grant in 2011-12.

The purpose of the grant is to help councils trial and run e-waste collections.

Councils have already used these funds to promote collections and purchase items to streamline the collection.

MobileMuster will also pay councils \$2.20 per kilogram of mobile phone components collected through a council e-waste collection service as well as pick up and recycle all the mobile phone components for free.

Thanks again to over 300 participating local councils who collected more than 3,500 kilograms of mobile components in the last 12 months.

This included over 28,000 handsets and batteries and more than 1,800 kg of accessories diverted from landfill.

This also recovered over 740 kg of steel, 48 kg of aluminium, 68 grams of gold, 230 kg of plastics, 170 kg of copper and 630 kg of brass.

MOBILEMUSTER: Free Mobile Phone Recycling

MobileMuster is the official recycling program of the mobile phone industry and is a free service available to consumers, councils, businesses, schools and government. It is voluntarily funded solely by handset manufacturers and network carriers. The Australian Mobile Telecommunications Association (AMTA) manages MobileMuster on behalf of its members and runs the program on a not-for-profit basis.

The overall aim of MobileMuster is to prevent mobile phones ending up in landfill and potentially harming the environment. All mobiles are recycled, none are refurbished and resold. Over 90 per cent of the plastics and metals in mobiles are

recovered used to make new products. If the 19 million unused mobiles stashed away in Australian homes were recycled the estimated greenhouse gas benefits created would be equivalent to planting 100,000 trees or taking over 6,000 cars off the road!

Over 320 local councils currently work with MobileMuster to promote and collect mobile phones (including batteries, chargers and accessories) for recycling. Councils, with the support of MobileMuster, advise residents where and how they can recycle their old mobiles, host public collection points (over 950), run e-waste collection days and in some instances have incorporated mobile phones into their kerbside recycling collections.

AMTA, through MobileMuster, is committed to the development of an integrated e-Waste collection program that is free to consumers, easy to access and funded by industry, and has already supported a number of councils through the MobileMuster e-Waste Grants program. AMTA has played an active role in the development of the TV and computer product stewardship scheme and legislation.
